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Pastoral Ponderings



I first attempted to take a sabbatical in 2018. When our application for a clergy grant renewal was declined, we decided to try one more time, which postponed the sabbatical until 2019. At that time, way back in 2017, you and I entered into an agreement that I would have another sabbatical in 2024. I began as pastor here in 2010. The thinking was that I would experience two renewal leaves across 14 years of service, which averages out to one for every seven years, a traditional Sabbath approach.

I have always appreciated that thoughtfulness. None of us could have anticipated that a world-wide pandemic would change the landscape so thoroughly between 2017 and now. That has only upped the ante of how truly welcome and necessary this renewal is. Clergy are not exempt from the pressures that led to the Great Resignation. In early 2021, the Barna group reported that 29% of pastors had considered quitting full-time ministry within the last 12 months. By November that year, the number had risen to 38%. The last statistic I saw was 42% reported by Barna in March 2022. I personally knew several colleagues who either took early retirement or went into other vocations in the immediate aftermath of pandemic.

I never wanted to quit and felt no diminishment of my sense of call to Emmanuel. However, more than a year ago, I began to identify some warning signs of burn-out in myself. We are all weary, all working to regain our equilibrium as the changes keep coming at us, and we struggle to keep up. Recognizing the privilege inherent in being afforded the dedicated time for rest and recovery, I can only respond with gratitude and the commitment to use it for my well-being and yours.

Just as we are starting to pose extremely important questions about our purpose and our building, I am departing for a while. That may seem like poor timing. On the other hand, my absence enables EBC's capable leadership the freedom to start exploring paths for decisions which are ultimately the congregation's to make. The building team and the vision team will meet through the summer, and I will jump right back on board in September.

Pittsburgh starting May 13. As we laid our plans, Jim and I anticipated

We will also have several weeks at home, during which I want




to catch up on yardwork and household projects and immerse myself in days of deferred reading. My intention is to return to you with

Marchers, Petitions Demand Justice for the Poor

On March 2, seven people — Mike Asbury, Jean Burton, Mark Chaffin, Finnian Craine, Nancy and Richard Horan, and Edith Leet – from our Emmanuel family took part in the Poor People's Campaign march to take demands for justice for the poor to our elected officials. The demonstration was part of a nation-wide effort that saw marches in 22 state capitols.

Copies of several of the signs they carried were then taken to Fellowship Hall, where a petition was placed under each sign saying "I Agree. Please Make It So!" Later those petitions were taken to



our federal, state, and local elected officials: Governor Kathy Hochul, State Assemblywoman Pat Fahy, State Assemblyman John McDonald, State Senator Neil Breslin, Congressman Paul Tonko, U.S. Senators Chuck Schumer and Elise Stefanik, and Albany Mayor Kathy Sheehan. Each of those officials bear responsibility for constructing the budgets and legislation that can bring justice to the people being advocated for.




